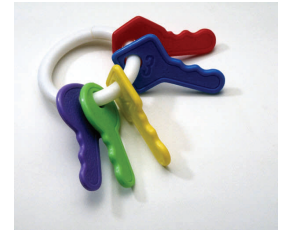

The steering committee is pleased to have Evelyn Wotherspoon open this year's Assessment Workshop. Evelyn is a Calgary based social worker and the only Canadian Zero To Three Fellow who is an infant mental health consultant specializing in infant trauma and maltreatment. She has spent over 30 years working with high risk families as a child welfare investigator, supervisor and clinician. She previously managed the developmental services and disruptive behaviour disorder clinics for the Alberta Children's Hospital. Evelyn has given presentations on the needs of maltreated infants throughout the United States and Canada. Locally she is well known to our judiciary as an expert witness in child maltreatment cases, and was one of the speakers at a recent judicial education conference

Lessons learned from international communities*

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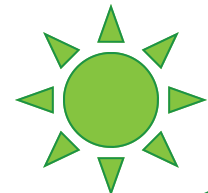
